The Kingmaker's Sisters

The story of six sisters divided by the War of the Roses

As the war between the Houses of York and Lancaster ebbed and flowed, the fortunes of and the relationships between the sisters were affected deeply.

Warwick the Kingmaker's authority was so great that he could effectively decide who would rule England during the Wars of the Roses (1455–1487).

- Explores the role of these women in 15th Century society, looking at their lives while their husbands were away fighting— as wives, mothers and homemakers, how they coped with their difficulties and used their influence to deputise in both local and national politics.
- Based on archival material, it is the first time the Wars of the Roses has been studied from a feminine point of view.
- His six sisters—Joan, Cecily, Eleanor, Alice, Katherine and Margaret, all married great noblemen, only to find themselves part of a conflict in which their brother and husbands jostled for power.
- Scholarly but accessible it will appeal to historians of the period, to those interested in feminist history and for general readership.

David Baldwin teaches medieval history at the University of Leicester's Vaughan College. He is also the author of *Ann Neville*; *Elizabeth Woodville*: *Mother to the Princes in the Tower* and *The Lost Prince: the Survival of Richard of York*, and is a frequent contributor to The Ricardian.
