Richard III And His Times – Non-Fiction

Arthurson, Ian. *The Perkin Warbeck Conspiracy 1491-1499*. Sutton Publishing, © 1994, 1997 paperback
Well-written and scholarly examination of Warbeck, with assumption that he was not Richard of York.

Ashdown-Hill, John. *The Last Days of Richard III and the Fate of His DNA* The History Press © 2013
paperback

The book, written before the discovery of Richard's remains, looks at the last 150 days of Richard's life and includes a chapter on the research that led the author to Canada's Joy Ibsen. The book was updated after the discovery of Richard.

Ashdown-Hill, John. *The Third Plantagenet: George Duke of Clarence, Richard III's Brother*. The History Press © 2014. Hardcover.

The often-overlooked Clarence is given an in-depth look at his short life in the shadows of history, as well as the Ashdown-Hill treatment with an examination of his own adventures after death and his living descendants.

Ashdown-Hill, John. *The Dublin King: The True Story of Edward Earl of Warwick, Lambert Simnel and the Princes in the Tower*. History Press, © 2017. paperback.

Ashdown-Hill examines the story of the boy-king crowned in Dublin in 1487 as Edward VI of England. Was he a prince or was he a pretender?

Baldwin, David. *The Lost Prince: The Survival of Richard of York*. Sutton Publishing. © 2007 hardcover.
Looks at the theory that Richard, the younger son of Edward IV, not only outlived Richard III, but his usurper and his son, Henry VIII, and died in 1550, having worked as a bricklayer. He supports his theory by contemporary documents. The 1st chapter is an excellent look at what was being said about the Princes and by whom in the first 20 years or so.

Baldwin, David. *Richard III*. Amberley, © 2012, paperback

The author was a university lecturer and suggests that Richard's complex and difficult childhood, in which his father, uncle, and elder brother were killed and he himself sent into exile all before his ninth birthday could account for the drastic measures he took later to secure his position.

A souvenir booklet of Richard and Leicester featuring lots of pictures.

Baldwin, David, Michael Jones, Philippa Gregory. *The Women of the Cousins' War: The Duchess, the Queen, and the King's Mother*. Simon & Schuster, 2011 paperback 342 p.

Two historians and a novelist examine Jacquetta of Luxembourg (Gregory), Elizabeth Woodville (Baldwin) and Margaret Beaufort (Jones) in chapters.

Bennett, H.S. *The Pastons and Their England*. Cambridge University Press, © 1921, 1968 edition
paperback

Everyday life in 15th-century England illustrated with extracts from the Paston Letters.

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Barnfield, Marie. *The Itinerary of Richard, Duke of Gloucester 1452-1483* The Richard III Society, 2024 Hardcover 109 p.

An overview of Richard III's movements in the years before he became king, starting with his birth in 1452.. This uses primary source documents only.

An in-depth look at the years 1485-87.

The introduction is thoroughly updated and revised. The text reflects what Buc actually wrote as opposed to what his nephew published. Kincaid's extensive historical notes, reflect the latest knowledge right up to 2021.

Buck, Sir George. *The History of the Life and Reigne of Richard the Third*. 1979 paperback version edited by Arthur Noel Kincaid, with a 139-page introduction and extensive notes.
The first full-scale defence of Richard, somewhat discursive and truncated by Buck's nephew when published. This is NOT the edition released in 2023.

Carson A.J. (Ed.), J. Ashdown-Hill, D. Johnson, W. Johnson, and P.J. Langley. *Finding Richard III: The Official Account of Research by the Retrieval and Reburial Project*. Imprimis Imprimatur © 2014, Paperback

A short but engaging and scholarly read about the research leading up to the 2012 Greyfriars excavation. The book also features maps and illustrations, as well as copious footnotes.

Carson, Annette. *A Small Guide to the Great Debate*. Imprimis Imprimatur © 2013. Paperback.
This handbook outlines how Richard came to be portrayed as a monster-villain, and how a backlash in later centuries created the Great Debate over his reputation, which still rages today.

Carson, Annette. *Richard III: The Maligned King*. The History Press ©2008 Hardcover.
Features a positive reassessment of Richard III, based on original sources, looking at events, not personalities. Principle amendments and an index are included as separate documents. Written before the discovery of his remains

Castor, Helen. *Blood and Roses: One Family's Struggle and Triumph During the Tumultuous Wars of the Roses*. Harper Collins © 2006 hardcover.

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Castor looks at the letters of the Paston family and from them reconstructs the story of this ordinary family caught up in extraordinary times.

Cheetham, Anthony. *The Life and Times of Richard III*. Weidenfield & Nicolson, © 1972. Hardcover
Popular style, favourable biography with copious illustrations, a little out of date.

Clive, Mary. *This Sun of York: A Biography of Edward IV*. Sphere © 1973, 1975 paperback
Readable, popularized biography.

Cornwallis, Sir William the Younger. *The Encomium of Richard III*. A.N. Kincaid (Ed.) Turner &
Devereux, © 1977. Photocopy in a binder
A scholarly edition of an early paradoxical defence of Richard.

The Coronation of Elizabeth Wydeville: Queen Consort of Edward IV on May 26th, 1465. A Contemporary Account Now First Set Forth From a XV Century Manuscript by George Smith. Ellis: London 1935
Hardcover

Pages 14 – 25 contain the actual manuscript, the rest of the book has biographical information about the people mentioned.

Sutton Publishing, © 1983.

Transcripts in original spelling of all materials relating to the preparation for the coronation, the ceremony itself and the banquet, with full introductions and notes, including a chronology of events from April to July 1483 and biographies of the participants.

Richard's life as seen through original documents in the National Archives. The documents are pictured with a translation.

Drewett, Richard & Mark Redhead. *The Trial of Richard III*. Alan Sutton Publishing, © 1984, 1985
paperback in library. 2 copies.

Full (5½ hours) text of the televised (4 hours) trial with introductory chapters on the making of the programme.

Edwards, Rhoda. *The Itinerary of King Richard III 1483-1485*. Richard III Society, © 1985 paperback.
Much of the itinerary is simply a list of dates and locations, but the introduction is a useful discussion on what can be gained by studying this itinerary.

Evans, H.T. *Wales and the War of the Roses*. Introduction by R.A. Griffiths. Wrens Park Publishing, ©
1915, 1998 this edition.

Although recent research obviously is not included, this is considered a seminal work.

Rhys ap Thomas, or one of his men, dealt the lethal blow to Richard that ended the Plantagenet era. The book looks at Rhys' life leading up to and after the Battle of Bosworth as a favourite of Henry Tudor.

Fields, Bertram. *Royal Blood: Richard III and the Mystery of the Princes.* Harper Collins, © 1998. Hardcover
Hollywood entertainment lawyer Fields has written a readable popular history.

Fortescue, Sir John *On the Laws and Governance of England.* Shelley Lockwood (Ed.) Cambridge University Press, © 1997 paperback.

Fortescue, c. 1395-1477, was a lawyer and political theorist. His work was read by both Edward IV and Richard.

Foss, Peter J. *The Field of Redemore: The Battle of Bosworth, 1485.* Rosalba Press, 1990.

Uses documentary and topographical evidence to suggest that Dadlington was the site of the battle. Although now considered out of date, it can be useful to compare with more recent theories.

Francis Lovell. West Midlands Branch, Richard III Society of England.

Twenty-page booklet on Lovell.

Gairdner, James. *The Battle of Bosworth.* Richard III Society, 1975. 27 p.

Gairdner's article from *Archaeologia* plus extracts from the Croyland Chronicle, Vergil's *Anglica Historia*, and the Battle of Bosworth Field.

Gies, Frances and Joseph. *A Medieval Family: The Pastons of Fifteenth-Century England.* Harper Collins © 1988. Hardcover

Using the letters as the foundation, the Gieses tell the stories of the Pastons and the world around them.

Gill, Louise *Richard III and Buckingham's Rebellion.* Sutton Publishing, 1999 Hardcover

In-depth look at just the rebellion, who participated and reasons why. Suggests that Richard was not a popular king and that many of the rebels were former supporters of his brother.

Gillingham, John. *The Wars of the Roses: Peace & Conflict in 15th-Century England.* Louisiana State Press, © 1981 Hardcover & Phoenix Press, 2001 paperback

Examines the campaigns and battles, and the politics behind them, showing their limited impact on the social and religious life of the country.

Goodman, Anthony *The Wars of the Roses: The soldiers' experience.* Tempus, ©2005, 2006

The ordinary soldier left little in the way of remembrances from the Wars of the Roses, so Goodman spreads his writing further afield in both time and geography to create a sense of who fought and died in these battles.

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Goodwin, George. *Fatal Colours: The Battle of Towton 1461*. Phoenix, ©2011 Paperback

The majority of this book sets up the reasons for the battle, from a weak Henry VI to Richard of York to Edward IV.

Well-illustrated biography of Richard based mainly upon quotations from contemporary documents in original spelling, with linking commentary.

Hammond, P.W. *The Battles of Barnet and Tewkesbury*. St. Martin's Press © 1990 Hardcover. 150 p. History leading up to the battles and a look at the legend that Edward of Lancaster had been killed after the battle.

Hancock, Peter A. *Richard III and the Murder in the Tower*. History Press © 2011. Paperback Looking at the less famous murder in the Tower associated with Richard, that of William Hastings, and the possible reasons why Richard behaved the way he did on that summer's day in 1483.

Hanham, Alison, *Richard III and his early historians 1483 – 1535* Clarendon Press ©1975 Hardcover 230 pages (small 14cm X23 cm like many others) Unlike Potter's book which looks at historians up to the early 20th C, Hanham focuses on writers like Rous, Virgil and More. No fan of Richard, she nevertheless finds fault with these authors who do not measure up to current standards as historians but did create the "literary" Richard that became Shakespeare's king.

Hicks, Michael. *Anne Neville: Queen to Richard III*. The History Press © 2007 Paperback. Anne Neville's short and largely undocumented life is told by an author who does not like her husband. This book is part of a series on England's forgotten queens edited by Alison Weir.

Hicks, Michael. *Edward V: The Prince in the Tower*. Tempus Publishing, © 2003 hardcover. A biography of the young uncrowned king, which also looks at his parents and the contemporary political scenery. Also features numerous illustrations, both in colour and in black and white.

Hicks, M.A., *False, Fleeting, Purjure'd Clarence: George, Duke of Clarence 1449 – 78*. Alan Sutton ©1980 Detailed and scholarly biography. 200 p. plus appendices

Hicks, M.A. *Richard III and His Rivals: Magnetes and Their Motives in the Wars of the Roses*. Hamble don Press, © 1991. Hardcover

Reprint of 24 articles on a wide range of biographical and historical topics including Richard, George, Thomas Cook, Hastings, the Hungerford family, Somerset, the Woodvilles, etc.

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Hicks, Michael. *Richard III: The Man Behind the Myth*. Collins & Brown © 1991 paperback
A biography of Richard, by a former student of Charles Ross, which covers the background of the Wars of the Roses, through to and including the creation of the “monster” by Richard’s detractors.

Higginbotham, Susan. *The Woodvilles: The Wars of the Roses and England’s Most Infamous Family*. History Press © 2013. Hardcover.

A non-fiction look by a fiction author at the powerful Woodville clan and their role in the Wars of Roses and its aftermath. The book also features a number of wills written by the Woodvilles as an appendix.

Includes introduction that examines the history of the narrative.

Part of the Cambridge Studies in Medieval Life and Thought series, the book looks at the system of royal patronage and royal authority in the time of Richard.

Horspool, David. *Richard III: A Ruler and His Reputation*. Bloomsbury Press © 2015. Hardcover.
A “ground-breaking” biography, which suffers from some fence-sitting concerning Richard’s alleged crimes.

A history of the church and manor with very little given to description of the church.

Jones, Michael. *Bosworth 1485: The Battle That Transformed England*. Pegasus Books © 2015. Paperback
Having written books on the battles of Agincourt, Leningrad, and Stalingrad, Jones turns his gaze to Bosworth. Updated after the discovery of Richard’s remains in 2012, which shed new light on that seismic event.

Kendall, Paul Murray. *Louis XI: The Universal Spider*. Phoenix Press, © 1971, 2001 paperback. 464 p.
A scholarly biography of the French king, contemporary of Edward IV.

Detailed readable modern biography, sympathetic to Richard.

Kendall, Paul Murray. *The Yorkist Age*. George Allen & Unwin, © 1962. Hardcover 525p.
Using original sources such as the Paston letters and town records, Kendal attempts to recreate the lives of everyday people.

Well researched book. The author is convinced that Perkin Warbeck was indeed Richard, Duke of York, son of Edward IV

Reprint of ten articles, originally published between 1956 and 1973, including an excellent article on attainder.

Five years of work by researchers in many countries has resulted in some remarkable discoveries. Langley believes she has proven that the 2 Princes survived years after Richard's death.

The chapters alternate between the two authors as they tell their parallel stories, Langley of her search and the subsequent discovery of Richard, and Jones, a noted military historian, of Richard's life and death.

Laynesmith's scholarly biography of Cecily Neville looks at the mother of kings who lived through the Wars of the Roses and how her personality shaped the conflict that shaped history.

Out of date in some respects, this is still an excellent look at the period by a noted scholar.

Ideas, attitudes and opinions about 15th-century politics and society as they were expressed in contemporary verse.

Skidmore, Chris *Richard III: Brother Protector King*. Weidenfeld & Nicolson © 2017 Paperback
